



In the Story center

What is Holi?

Holi is a joyful spring festival celebrated mainly in India and Nepal. It's often called the Festival of Colors. Holi happens in March, on the full moon day of the Hindu month Phalguna. The exact date changes every year.

Holi celebrates:

- The arrival of spring
- Good winning over evil
- Friendship, forgiveness, and new beginnings

People celebrate by:

- Throwing brightly colored powder (called gulal)
- Spraying colored water
- Dancing, singing, and playing music
- Visiting friends and family
- Sharing sweets and special foods

What happens the night before Holi?

The night before Holi is called Holika Dahan. People light a bonfire to remember a story about good defeating evil.

What do the colors mean?

Different colors often represent:

- Red – love and celebration
- Yellow – happiness and health
- Green – new beginnings and spring
- Blue – calm and peace

Who celebrates Holi?

- Celebrated by Hindus, but people of many religions and cultures join in.
- It's a time when everyone celebrates together, no matter age or background.

Fun Fact!

- During Holi, people greet each other by saying: "Happy Holi!" or "Holi Hai!"
